Vol. 119: InterAction Aid Delivers 2023 report, 20th Anniversary of PEPFAR, & multiple Calls for Submissions

## **Quick Summary**

**InterAction published its annual** <u>report</u> "**Aid Delivers 2023.**" This report illustrates the "impact of U.S. foreign assistance through development and humanitarian programs; highlights the impacts of key U.S. government foreign assistance programs and issues; and showcases the fundamental principles that foreign assistance must follow." The report includes a specific section on how U.S. government foreign assistance programs affect children and youth globally. The report recommends that the U.S. government and policymakers "must recognize the interconnected needs of children and youth regardless of where they live. Young people need to be supported at every stage of their lives to achieve their full potential. Programs and policies must invest in their most critical needs because the health, wellbeing, and economic security of an entire generation of children and youth are at stake." The U.S. government is celebrating the 20th anniversary of the U.S. President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR). To date, PEPFAR has provided "20.1 million people with life-saving HIV treatment in over 55 countries." The U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken stated in a press statement that the Biden Administration is "committed to ensuring all LGBTQI+ individuals are treated with dignity and respect, closing pernicious gender gaps, and ending HIV/AIDS as a public health threat by 2030." In addition to the U.S. government, UN AIDS along with "ministers and representatives from twelve African countries have committed themselves, and laid out their plans, to end AIDS in children by 2030." They committed these plans to the Dar-es-Salaam Declaration on ending AIDS in children. The work will center on four pillars:

- 1. Early testing and optimal treatment and care for infants, children, and adolescents;
- 2. Closing the treatment gap for pregnant and breastfeeding women living with HIV, to eliminate vertical transmission;
- 3. Preventing new HIV infections among pregnant and breastfeeding adolescent girls and women; and
- 4. Addressing rights, gender equality, and the social and structural barriers that hinder access to services.

The Education Cannot Wait (ECW) Youth- and Student-led Subgroup launched a campaign that calls on humanitarian funds to create youth constituencies and empower them to elect representatives in their decision-making structures. This campaign calls to "fully include students and young people in the decision-making process, as they are the ultimate beneficiaries and those who are both the most vulnerable and the best suited to assess and contribute to the policies directed to them. Special focus needs to be placed on the students and young people coming from the Global South and the countries in which humanitarian funds are provided." Additionally, they state that "a special role in organizing these fora and in mainstreaming the student's voice needs to be ensured for organized and established representative organizations that serve as platforms at the global and regional levels."
