Call to Action

The United Nations Association of the United States (UNA-US) is seeking signatures for its petition to secure funding for the Green Climate Fund. Quick Summary

USAID <u>Administrator</u> Samantha Power addressed the Senate Foreign Relations Committee during the Budget <u>Hearing</u> on April 26th. She stated that "During our lifetimes, the United States has helped accelerate tremendous progress in reducing extreme poverty, fighting disease, addressing hunger, getting kids in school, and fueling democracy's rise. But now, many of these trends have moved into reverse." She also emphasized the humanitarian devastation around the world as a national security risk.

She explained that "...our national security hinges on this work. Deprivation and indignity abroad can fuel resource competition, political fragility, and extremism that endangers us here at home. Disease outbreaks can cross oceans, and recessions in foreign markets can threaten our own economic growth. And if we don't lead efforts to take on these challenges, the People's Republic of China and Putin are ready to step in, whether through opaque loans on unfavorable terms, or with mercenaries in tow." She called for resumed progress towards the continued gains in global health, education, and prosperity. To read and watch this hearing, click here.

The Cities <u>Summit</u> of the Americas happened last week in Denver, Colorado. The Summit brought together mayors and city leaders from North, Central, and South America to discuss critical issues that are facing the Americas. The goal of the Summit was to "promote regional cooperation, convening subnational leaders from across the entire Western Hemisphere with diverse and inclusive representatives of government, civil society, business, academia, youth, culture and the arts, and indigenous and underrepresented groups."

The first of many events included a conversation with <u>Ambassador</u> Nina Hachigian, the U.S. Special Representative for City and State Diplomacy. She emphasized the importance of collaborating with mayors and governors when it comes to international diplomacy. This includes cities and local governments working with the private sectors and investing more in foreign affairs offices in local governments. She also elaborated on the importance of young people at the local level, highlighting that t "Youth are extremely powerful...Youth push the needle." Another side event included a discussion with Ukrainian Mayor Oleksandr Kodola, of Nizhyn; Mayor Ivan Fedorov, of Melitopo; Mayor Yurix Bova, of Trostyanets; and Mayor Ihor Terekhov, of Kharkiv. They spoke on the specific needs of each city when it comes to aid. All of the mayors emphasized the magnitude of the crisis in Ukraine and how difficult it is to govern during this time. They also spoke on the multitude of war crimes, including those committed on children. You can watch that conversation here.

Ambassador Linda Thomas-Greenfield, Representative of the United States to the United Nations and the United Nations Security Council held a conversation with young people about current global issues. She emphasized the role cities play in international affairs, noting that policies are implemented by cities and mayors, who have direct engagement with the communities. Local governments around the world often work with other governments in policy and aid decisions. Ambassador Thomas-Greenfield also spoke on the current crisis in Sudan and the importance of paying attention to the continent of Africa. She stated that "we live in a global world and we can't cushion ourselves from the rest of the world. If you don't engage today, it will be your problem tomorrow." She explained that Africa is the final frontier for progress because the people who live there are young; the median age is 19. She stated that "These young people are going to be the future and will be dealing with climate change, war and peace and more." To learn more about this event, click here.
